1. Big ideas worksheets

Big idea 1: Pride & Prejudice: Misjudgement and Growth

1. What first impressions shape Elizabeth's view of Darcy?

- 2. What assumptions does Darcy make about Elizabeth's family?
- 3. How do pride and prejudice affect their behaviour?
- 4. How do both characters grow by the end of the novel?

Quote task: Find a quotation that shows a moment of misjudgement.

Big idea 2: Love & Marriage: Choice vs Expectation

- 1. Why is marriage so important in the novel's society?
- 2. Compare Charlotte Lucas's views on marriage with Elizabeth's.
- 3. Which marriages are presented as successful? Why?

Extension: Is Austen more critical of romantic or practical marriages?

Big idea 3: Class, Rank & Social Mobility

- 1. How does social class shape characters' opportunities?
- 2. Identify two examples of class prejudice.
- 3. What does Austen suggest about true worth?

Task: Create a class ladder placing five key characters.

Big idea 4: Reason vs Emotion

- 1. When does Elizabeth act emotionally rather than rationally?
- 2. How does Darcy struggle between feeling and judgment?
- 3. Why is balance between reason and emotion important?

Short response: Which character best balances reason and emotion?

Big idea 5: Reputation, Gender & Social Pressure

- 1. Why is reputation especially important for women?
- 2. How does Lydia's behaviour threaten the Bennet family?
- 3. How does Austen criticise double standards?

Quote analysis: Find a quote that shows social pressure.





Big idea 6: Family, Influence & Upbringing

- 1. How do Mr and Mrs Bennet influence their daughters differently?
- 2. Compare the Bennet parents with the Gardiners.
- 3. How does family shape character?

Reflection: Which family provides the best guidance?





2. Character study worksheets

ELIZABETH BENNET

- 1. List three defining traits of Elizabeth.
- 2. Identify two moments where she misjudges others.
- 3. How does she change across the novel?

Creative task: Write Elizabeth's thoughts after reading Darcy's letter.

MR FITZWILLIAM DARCY

- 1. How is Darcy first presented to the reader?
- 2. What causes his transformation?
- 3. Is Darcy proud, shy, or both?

Task: Create Darcy's emotional arc.

JANE BENNET

- 1. How does Jane view other people?
- 2. How does her temperament differ from Elizabeth's?
- 3. Is Jane too trusting?

Short task: Write Jane's response to Bingley's departure.

GEORGE WICKHAM

- 1. Why is Wickham initially appealing?
- 2. How does he manipulate appearances?
- 3. What role does he play in the novel's conflict?

Task: Identify warning signs Elizabeth ignores.

LYDIA BENNET

- 1. How does Lydia behave differently from her sisters?
- 2. Why is her elopement dangerous?
- 3. What lesson does Austen teach through Lydia?

Extension: Is Lydia foolish or a victim of upbringing?





3. Theme pathways

THEME: PRIDE & PREJUDICE

1. Define pride and prejudice in your own words.

2. Identify characters who display each.

Paragraph task: Explain how misjudgement drives the plot.

THEME: LOVE & MARRIAGE

1. Rank the marriages in the novel from happiest to least happy.

2. Justify your ranking with evidence.

Task: Write a paragraph on Austen's message about marriage.

THEME: CLASS & SOCIAL PRESSURE

1. How does class limit personal choice?

2. How does Elizabeth challenge class expectations?

Reflection: Does class still matter today?

4. Close reading and quote analysis

QUOTE ANALYSIS 1

"Till this moment, I never knew myself."

- 1. What realisation does Elizabeth have here?
- 2. Why is self-knowledge important in the novel?
- 3. How does this moment change the story?

QUOTE ANALYSIS 2

"My good opinion once lost is lost forever."

- 1. What does this quote reveal about Darcy?
- 2. How does Darcy's view change later?

Short task: Rewrite this quote in modern language.





5. Essay and creative preparation

ESSAY PREPARATION

Choose one question:

- 1. How does Austen show the dangers of first impressions?
- 2. *Pride and Prejudice* explores growth through self-knowledge. Discuss.

Planning scaffold:

- Thesis

CREATIVE RESPONSE PREPARATION

Choose one:

- Elizabeth's diary after Darcy's first proposal
- Darcy's private reflection after his rejection
- A missing conversation between Jane and Elizabeth
